

Living in lockdown with a neurological condition

There are an estimated **one million people in Scotland who live with a neurological condition** for whom there was a noticeable deterioration in their physical and mental condition during the Covid-19 pandemic. **The need for respite is now greater than ever**.

Impact on carers in Scotland

- Over 227,000 (58%) of Scots who started caring since the outbreak are also juggling paid work alongside their caring responsibilities
- 70% of carers are spending more on food, and 53% are spending more on household bills. 38% are worried about their financial situation

Impact on mental wellbeing

72% of people with Parkinson's said socialising with family and friends had become more difficult & lack of social contact and loneliness was devastating

Impact on physical wellbeing

- 15% of those with MS in Scotland had their care and support reduced or cancelled
- 34% of people with Parkinson's said reduced access to exercise had a big impact on their lives and were worried about the long-term effects on their health

Leuchie supports the NHS NHS



After deciding to temporarily close for respite in March 2020, to protect the health of the vulnerable families we support, Leuchie was able re-purpose its facility and staff team to help the NHS. Our highly skilled nursing and care team began welcoming patients who were in hospital but did not require intensive medical care, freeing up critical beds needed to fight the Covid-19 pandemic. Staff nurse, Kirsty Telfer, offers an insight into what that transition meant for Leuchie.

As a nurse in the charity sector, over the past few months, I've seen huge changes in how we operate due to the Covid-19 pandemic. In March, the announcement was made that Leuchie would temporarily close its doors to our respite guests and although I understood why, knowing that all our wonderful guests would be required to self-isolate for 12 weeks with minimal contact nearly broke my heart.

We said "cheerio" to our final few guests on 19 March and many of us felt a bit numb but we tried to keep our spirits high. It helps that Leuchie staff are great at remaining positive and having a giggle!

When the news came that Leuchie would be taking in NHS patients, I felt a huge sense of pride to be supporting our wonderful Health Service, but at the same time I was anxious about what this would

look like. Before we knew it, we opened our doors and welcomed our first two lovely residents! It felt good to have some people back in the house and many, many laughs were shared over this time. The new residents quickly realised Leuchie's unique qualities and why it is such a special place.

Working in this way was a steep learning curve for us, presenting us with many challenges, but with the Leuchie team being as strong as it is, we pulled together and adapted to overcome each obstacle. The care and compassion shown by staff shone through more than ever during this time as we worked tirelessly to protect those who are vulnerable against this awful virus - all while providing the best level of care possible to our new residents, because caring is what we do.



Leuchie's new look

We used lockdown as an opportunity to improve Leuchie and have invested roughly £200k refurbishing the house for the benefit of our guests, renovating 13 bedrooms, 2 lounges, 3 bathrooms (including a jacuzzi bath with one of the best views in Scotland!) and a sluice, as well as installing over 5,500 km of Wi-Fi cabling.

This work was made possible by funding raised through the Leuchie Forever Fund and a number of other restricted grants given solely for this purpose.

Our exciting plans for the future are ambitious but achievable

More space to support more people

The need for additional bedrooms at Leuchie has escalated due to Covid-19, which saw our ability to support people living with the long-term effects of a neurological condition greatly reduced at a time when it was needed most.

We're excited to have commissioned architect drawings to increase our single rooms from 15 to 18 and we have plans to convert the lower ground wing of Leuchie House to an additional 3 bedrooms to increase capacity for long-term sustainability.

Taking guests to new heights

To achieve these goals, we need to raise £500k in addition to the £2 million required for our core service, providing essential respite breaks for families living with the long-term effects of a neurological condition.

Plans have been received to make the grounds more accessible and create a circular walkway for independent or aided access.

Pecoming a centre for excellence for technology-enabled care
